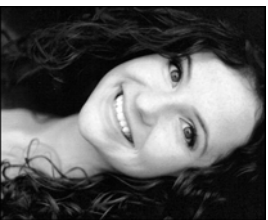
Artist Biographies

Michelle Shupe (Dramaturge) most recently dramaturged The Project's readings of *The Merry Wives of Windsor* and *Mary Stuart*. She has acted with The Project in *Measure for Measure* (which she also dramaturged), and she made her acting debut with The Project in last season's *Antony & Cleopatra*. She previously appeared as Lady Macbeth in The Project's *PAGE TO STAGE* education outreach program. Michelle has been seen on stage at the Illinois Shakespeare Festival, where she appeared as Titania in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, Elizabeth in *Richard III* and Nerine in *Scapin*. Favorite roles include Dionyza in Mary Zimmerman's *Pericles* at the Shakespeare Theatre/ Goodman, Lady Chatterley in *Lady Chatterley's Lover*, for which she was nominated for a Helen Hayes award, and Imogen in *Cymbeline*, for which she was also nominated for a Helen Hayes Award. She has performed in New York at Axis Theater, and in Washington, DC at The Shakespeare Theater, Studio Theatre, Signature Theatre, Theater J, The Washington Shakespeare Company (former ensemble member) and many others.

Mary Ringstad (Music Arrangements) appeared as Octavia and Diomedes in last season's *Antony and Cleopatra*. She has directed *Much Ado About Nothing*, *All's Well That Ends Well*, and *Love's Labor's Lost* for The Project, and assistant directed *King Lear*. Previous appearances include *The Comedy of Errors*, *As You Like It*, *A Women of No Importance*, *Ghosts*, *My Name Is Will*, the title role in *The Rape of Lucrece*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Julius Caesar*, *Othello*, *Titus Andronicus*, *As You Like It*, *Richard III*, *Henry VI Part I*, *Much Ado About Nothing*, *Edward II*, *Macbeth*, *Taming of the Shrew*, *Henry IV part II* and *The Merry Wives of Windsor*. Mary, who has an MFA in Acting from Ohio University, is an adjunct faculty member at Oakton Community College. Mary also serves on The Project's Board of Directors.

George Zahora (Sound Design) was lured back into the dark and dangerous world of sound design when his wife — The Project's Associate Artistic Director, Barbara Zahora — directed *The Merry Wives of Windsor* earlier this season. Over the past 20 years George has logged time behind the mixing board for roughly two dozen non-Equity productions. He is always happy to take time away from his day job, which involves lots of intensive tinkering with electronics and computer equipment, to do sound design, which involves lots of intensive tinkering with *different* electronics and computer equipment... and he's proud to support the skilled, professional actors that The Project invariably attracts.

Manders in *Ghosts*, multiple roles in *Henry V*, Boyet in *Love's Labour's Lost*, the title role in Jeff Christian's adaptation of *Faust*, Leontes in *A Winter's Tale* and Duncan in *Macbeth*. Peter has worked with the Steppenwolf and Organic Theatre companies, the Body Politic, Pegasus Players and with the Oak Park Festival and Illinois Shakespeare Festival (three seasons). Artist Biographies

Fredric Stone (Prospero) last appeared as Lord Burleigh in *Mary Stuart*. He is a founding member of The Project and has also appeared as Lepidus, Thyreus, and the Clown in *Antony and Cleopatra* and as Sir Anthony Absolute in *The Rivals*, as well as roles in *As You Like It*, *The Importance of Being Earnest*, *Much Ado About Nothing*, *Love's Labour's Lost*, *Faust*, *Ghosts*, *The Cricket on the Hearth* and many others. He was featured recently in the acclaimed and Jeff-recommended production of *Scorched* for the Silk Road Theatre Project. He performed in *The Chosen* (David Walter) at Steppenwolf and as Agamemnon in *Trojan Women* at the Goodman. At Chicago Shakespeare he's been featured in many productions including *Love's Labour's Lost* (Boyet), *Richard II* (Northumberland), *The Tempest* (Alonso), *Henry IV*, and *Henry V* (multiple roles). At the summer Utah Shakespeare Festival he played roles in *Henry V* and *As You Like It*. Other Chicago credits include *Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead* (Writers'), *Fires in the Mirror* (Northlight), *Beau Jest* (Victory Gardens), *Isn't It Romantic* (Ivanhoe), and work at the Court, Drury Lane Oakbrook and Illinois Theatre Center. Broadway and Off-Broadway credits include *All Over Town* and *Awake and Sing*; tours include *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum* with Zero Mostel. Mr. Stone also created, performed and toured in a one-person Shakespeare show, *Will and Testament (a life after death comedy)*. He teaches Shakespeare and coaches actors privately.



Charles Stransky (Gonzalo) made his Project debut earlier this season in *Measure For Measure*. A veteran character actor of stage, television and film, Charles attended graduate school at Brandeis University, where he earned his MFA Degree in Acting. He then worked in Chicago at the beginning of its burgeoning theatre movement before being called to Broadway. His numerous credits reflect the various venues he has performed in, from regional theatre to Off-Broadway to Broadway, and from day player parts to leading roles on film and television. On Broadway he played Ling in the original production of *Glengarry Glen Ross* and in the Goodman's original production and the national tour. He was in The Lincoln Center Theater's production of *The Front Page* at The Vivian Beaumont, playing Wilson, one of the reporters. He has played in regional theatres throughout the U.S., including the Goodman, Old Globe, Northlight, Capital Repertory, American Players Theatre, Riverside, Kitchen, the Delaware Theatre Company, the State Theatre in Austin, Texas, the Vermont Stage Company, and Wisdom Bridge. On film, he can be seen in *The Spanish Prisoner*, *Homicide*, and *Things Change*, all written and directed by David Mamet. Other films include *Dad*, *Stone Cold*, *Ghost in the Machine*, *Anger Management*, *Caleb's Door*, *Winning Season*, and *Pastime*. He has been a proud member of Actors' Equity Association (AEA), Screen Actors Guild (SAG) and the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA) for over thirty years.

Richard Shavzin (Trinculo) is delighted to be making his Project debut. He is equally delighted to be back on this side of the footlights, having mostly directed for the last 15 years, including a five-year stint in the mid-'90s as the Artistic Director at Strawdog. Acting credits include *Master Class* (with Elizabeth Ashley) at the Royal Alexandra in Toronto; *Dinner With Friends* at Madison Repertory; *The Flight of the Phoenix* at American Blues; *Dealing and Hedda Gabler* (understudy) at Northlight; *The Dybbuk*, *Social Security*, and *Fortune Cookies* at National Jewish Theatre; and *Search and Destroy*, *Wilhelm Reich in Hell* and *Absent Friends* at Strawdog. Directing chores have included *Ten Cent Night* for Chicago Dramatists; *Vick's Boy* for American Blues (then American Theater Company); *Tops or Bottoms*, *Fallout*, and *Defamation* for Canamac Productions; and many productions at Strawdog, including *Criminal Hearts*, *Cat's Paw*, *The Big Funk*, *Hurlburly*, and *Burn This*, for which he received a non-equity Joseph Jefferson Award for Direction. Richard is an Artistic Associate at Chicago Dramatists and American Blues. Poker, new plays, and the restored glory of the Green Bay Packers round out his copious free time.



Stephen Spencer (Sebastian) is pleased to be back on the boards with The Project. As a founding member, he's been involved in over 30 plays including *Measure for Measure* (Duke Vincentio); *Antony and Cleopatra* (Antony); *Henry VIII* (Henry); *Macbeth* (Macbeth); *Othello* (Iago); *Twelfth Night* (Orsino); *The Winter's Tale* (Autolycus); *King Lear* (Kent to Ray Wild's Lear); *Timon of Athens* (Timon); and *The Two Gentlemen of Verona* (Thurio). He directed Henry V and *The Duchess of Malfi* for The Project. Recent stage work includes *Night and Day* (Remy Bumpool); *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom* and *Wait Until Dark* at Court; *Joe Turner's Come and Gone* (Congo Square/Goodman) and Oak Park Festival's *Comedy of Errors* and *Love's Labour's Lost*. Steve does voiceovers, commercials and industrials and has appeared in over a dozen independent features and shorts in the Chicago market. Recent film: *Public Enemies*, starring Johnny Depp; *Harvest*; *Son of America*; *Greg's Leg*; and *Morning Due* (Cannes 2008). This summer he will be appearing with the Illinois Shakespeare Festival, playing Friar Laurence in *Romeo & Juliet* and Polixenes in *The Winter's Tale*. As always, love to Brenda and Keely.



Weston Blakesley (Stephano) made his Project debut earlier this season in *Measure for Measure*. In his 35 years of acting Weston has performed over 100 plays, half of those in Los Angeles, from classics like the title role in *Uncle Vanya*, *Mistress Quickly* in *Henry V* and Polonius in *Hamlet* to world premieres *Dickie & Babe: The Truth About Leopold & Loeb* (as Clarence Darrow) and *Missouri Waltz*, written by and starring Karen Black. Movie roles include Gus the barber in *Pleasantville*, Frederick Connelly in *Nothing Special* (starring Karen Black and Barbara Bain, currently making its way around the festival circuit), the Mangler in the low-budget horror film *The Mangler: Reborn*, and numerous low budget features. TV credits include recent roles on *Chuck* and *iCarly*, as well as roles in *Wings*, *Malcolm in The Middle*, *Married With Children*, *In Living Color*, *The West Wing*, *General Hospital*, *Monk* and *Providence*. 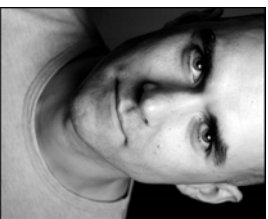

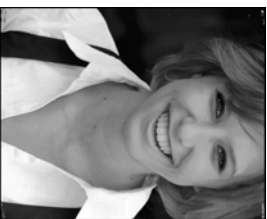

Schwartz's adaptation of John Milton's *Paradise Lost*. Acting credits with The Project include Richard III, Brutus, Proteus, Mercutio, Oberon/Bottom/Theseus, Enobarbus, Bassanio, Hortensio, Buckingham, Oliver, Amiens, Antonio (*Twelfth Night*), Richard (*Henry VI*), Leicester (*Mary Stuart*), Aegus (*In Medea Res*), Hamlet in *50 Minute Hamlet*, Satan (*Paradise Lost*) and one of the four actor/singers in *My Name is Will*. Other directing credits include *Mojo Mickeybo*, *A Whistle in the Dark* and *Our Father* (Seanachai), *The Skin of Our Teeth* (The Artistic Home), *Proof* and *Driving Miss Daisy* (New American Theater), *As You Like It*, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, *The Two Gentlemen of Verona* and *Love's Labour's Lost* (Lakeside Shakespeare, Michigan), the short film *Still Live*, both parts of *Angels in America* (The Journeyman, co-director and actor, sharing in three Jeff Awards and an After Dark Award), and James Krag's one-man show *According to Mark*. He is a member of the Seanachai ensemble, co-fronts the rock band Ingenious Whittier, is a creative consultant for Tessera Publishing and writes and directs live action and animated sequenc- es for the Emmy Award winning Digital Kitchen. Film work includes *Batman Begins*, *Witches' Night*, *The Express*, *The Poker House*, *Pickman's Muse*, *Helix*, *Cyrus* and *Good People*. 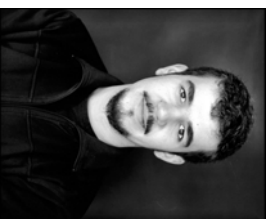
